CLASSES IN JUNE:

Monday, June 5: D-Day Stories—The Battle That Changed the World. Keith Buchanan will be speaking on the historical subject of the D-Day Normandy invasion that began the liberation of the European continent on the eve of the 73rd anniversary of that invasion. Stories from D-Day will include: 1. Ike and the dilemma the weather caused on D-Day. 2. Thoughts of 101st Airborne Paratroopers before taking off on June 5. 3. John Steele – Paratrooper hanging from a cathedral. 4. Ted Roosevelt, Jr. – Utah Beach guiding force. 5. Simon Fraser and Bill Millen – Inspirations on D-Day 6. Horace Flack – Fate sometimes has more in mind for one than they can ever expect. 7. A young Dutch girl's diary entry on June 6, 1944. Mr Buchanan has been both assisting and leading tours since 2013 for Ambrose Tours and

his body of work includes not only historical research but has personally interviewed many WWII vets as well as been a published author for articles in WWII magazine. Tuesday, June 6: Ticks and Tick-Borne Diseases in Western North Carolina. Prof. Steven Seagle of the Biology Dept. at ASU will discuss the most common ailments spread by ticks in our area and what steps we inhabitants of the high country can take in our gardens and yards to lower risk of contact with the vectors responsible for the spread of these diseases. Multiple diseases can be transmitted to humans by tick bites. Some of these diseases are relatively common and others are very rare. So what determines your risk of being exposed to ticks and the diseases they carry here in western North Carolina? The answer to this question is changing as some tick species are becoming more common and others more rare. This presentation will discuss the basic biology of tick species, tick-borne diseases found in western NC, changing risks for exposure to these diseases, how to lower your risk of tick bites, and what to do if you are bitten. 2:00 pm, 2nd floor conference room

Monday June 12: Monday at the Movies: "True Grit" (2010), 110 minutes. In the Coen Brothers' "True Grit," Jeff Bridges is not playing the John Wayne role. He's playing the role created in the enduring novel by Charles Portis, much of whose original dialogue can be heard in this film. Nominated for 10 Oscars. Directors and writers Ethan and Joel Cohen. Stars: Jeff Bridges, Matt Damon, and, Hailee Steinfeld and Matt Damon and Josh Brolin. Watauga Public Library, 2-4pm. Monday, June 19: Rome—The Bad Emperors. Presented by Dr. John Stephenson, ASU Art Dept. Even in their day, Romans had declared certain emperors "good" and others "bad." Based on a set of valued properties, each emperor was judged a success, or alternately a colossal failure. The implications were great, and Rome's bad emperors faced the destruction of their carefully created public personas as well as their images, memory and very physical bodies. It is in this breach that the Roman genius for political communication and propaganda is most exposed, and here we can examine the mix of artistic and literary projects that underpinned a leader's messaging and reputation. This talk examines some of the "bad emperors" in terms of visual communication and propaganda, looks at the tales of their outrageous behavior by the ancient historians, and seeks a fresh view of these maligned figures from the ancient world. Part of the talk will be a presentation of ancient Roman coins issued by each of several "bad" emperors, with a look at the positive messages they tried to communicate. 2:00 pm, 2nd floor conference room

Tuesday, June 20: Book Discussion—*Heart of Darkness* by Joseph Conrad. Dr. James Ivory will discuss with us the novella Heart of Darkness by the British author Joseph Conrad. This 75 page novella is available to read in full online at www.Gutenberg.org. The story centers around Marlow's journey up Africa's Congo River to meet Kurtz, both being connected to a Belgian Company involved in the ivory and rubber trade. The native inhabitants have been forced into the Company's service and suffer terribly from overwork and ill treatment from agents of imperialism. Consider how Africa's issues today grew out of this history. 2:00 pm, 2nd floor conference room

Thursday, June 22: Picnic on Flat Top Overlook. This is a short, delightful loop trail with signs along the way explaining the trees, shrubs, and plants located at mile 308.2 of the Blue Ridge Parkway. The loop trail is only 0.6 mi. long, with a fairly moderate rise up to a rock outcropping with spectacular views of the Linville Valley and Grandfather Mountain. Rated easy in the Blue Ridge Parkway literature. Bring lunch/your favorite drink, a walking stick, dark glasses and a hat for the sun. 10—2pm, carpooling from the Senior Center. Monday, June 26: The Protestant Reformation, Part 1 of 2. Presented by Dr. Alan Hauser. A number of factors led to the Protestant Reformation, which began in 1517 and rapidly encompassed most all of Europe, producing major leaders such as Martin Luther, John Calvin, Ulrich Zwingli, and John Knox, each with their own views of what constituted the core teachings of Christianity. The factors spurring on the Reformation include: the technology of the printing press, which made possible rapid communication over great distances; the shape and form of the Roman Catholic Church, which had significant issues both in its teachings and in its clerical

hierarchy; the impact of the Renaissance, which opened Europe to the revival of ancient learning and texts of the Bible in Greek and Hebrew, rather than Latin; the growth of large cities and international commerce; and the beginnings of science and the secularization of European society. The refocusing of Christianity that took place as a result of the Reformation has had a tremendous impact on European culture, one that persists to this day, with a wide variety of teachings present in the various contemporary denominations of Protestantism. 2:00 pm, 2nd floor conference room.

Monday, July 10: Monday at the Movies: "Chinatown" (1974), 130 minutes. Jack Nicholson Stars in this private-eye movie set in 1940's CA where a private detective hired to expose an adulterer finds himself caught up in a web of deceit, corruption and murder. Tuesday, July 18: The Denim Dynasty. Appalachian State University faculty member and documentary filmmaker Beth Davison will present her film "The Denim Dynasty," a

documentary about the legacy of the Cone family that shaped prominent features of North Carolina's landscape. A national park, a regional medical center, an amazing art collection, roads and schools all bear the name of the family whose corporation made North Carolina a leading producer of textiles for much of the 20th century. The documentary explores the early days of North Carolina's textile history through stories of the Cone family and the textile workers who lived and raised their families in the mill villages. Together, the Cone family and workers helped make Cone textiles a world leader in producing denim. The Cone family's story encompasses many of the themes that form the American narrative: immigration, reconstruction, industrial revolution, paternalism and philanthropy. 2:00 pm, 2nd floor conference room

Monday, July 24: Which Form of Exercise Best Improves and Preserves Cognitive Health As We Age? Prof. Erin Bouldin of the Dept. of Health and Exercise Science at ASU will discuss the relationship of physical activity to disability and cognitive health. 2:00 pm, 2nd floor conference room

Dr. Gary Walker, Biology Department, ASU, will review the early European botanists who ventured into the remote regions of the Southern Appalachians in search of new plant species. They were inspired by their own natural curiosity and the search for horticultural and medicinal uses of plants. Several discovered the similarities of the Appalachian flora to that of Eastern Asia and more northerly latitudes of North America. 2:00—3:30 pm, Dining Room, lst Floor.
